As though summer just started, summer is soon to end for the children and youth. For adults who have not had their own children, or for those whose children have grown, summer lasts until the autumnal equinox. For adults with children, their seasons revolve around the life of their offspring. And their summer is soon over too with the ringing of the school bell. Gone all too soon. Just when the rhythm of summer has settled in, the rhythm of the school year steals it away, with nine long months to wait.

I have always wished summer was longer. Summer struggles to be a top season for me as too often heat and insects force folks inside more than the cold of winter. Spring is by far the most elegant and delightful season, awakening the long dead earth to boundless life. Autumn is majestic and nostalgic. Winter brings freedom in many ways, and offers a time of

rest and reflection. But summer...to any person who ever grew up in a nine month school year, summer is a time of freedom and opportunity to enjoy life to its fullest. Yet now it's nearly gone. What can we do with what's left of it? What can we embrace? How can we stop wasting time with non-essentials and how can we savor every last sip? How can we build relationships and cherish our time together?

The month of July brought loss in my life. Our church said goodbye to three gems...Bud Thompson, Joyce Mathew and Shirley Mills. I believe I have also said my last goodbye to my final remaining cat, who was born in my closet 14 years ago. She's been gone for over a week, and though that was once normal for her, I don't expect to see her back. Her disappearance brought questions of life and death to my five year old's inquisitive mind. He forgets about death. He forgets about the passing of time. He can only live in the moment at his age. And so, he asked about death again. Will our dog die? Will he die? Will we all die? Yes, everything dies. Nothing can live forever on this earth. This life is only for a little bit of time. This life is fragile. We never know how long we have. Some lives don't make it out of the womb. Some lives last well over a hundred years. We just don't know how long we have. Also, we don't know when it is that we will say goodbye to another for the last time on earth. We naturally assume that we will see others again. But this is not the case. There is always a final time, and we do not know when that is.

If we knew that when we said goodbye to someone, or a pet, was the last time we would ever have the opportunity to see them, then how would that affect the time we spend with them? How would that affect our final embrace? How would we ever let go? We would show kindness, compassion, empathy, and deep love. We would share everything we have with

them. We would cease our distractions and give them all of our attention. We would push the business of life away and take more time to be together. We would look at them differently, with a love that we can only understand through the love God has for us. We would live, actually, the way Jesus taught us to live. We would love one another. And if we all did this, what a different world it would be! Heaven on earth would be built.

Moments will always be fleeting. Summer will never be long enough. Time will always be far to short when we are enjoying the beauty of this experience on earth. (Though often all too long when we are faced with troubles and illness.) All we have is right now. All we can do is embrace the moment at hand, and plan the best we can to manage our future so we get the most out of it. For one day, sooner or later, we will say goodbye to this world.

However, we do not ever need to say, "Goodbye." We only need to say, "Until we meet again." For we can have faith that this life is only the beginning. There is a long journey to come. This time on earth is a time to be connected to the physical and the spiritual. The life to come is that of only the spiritual. In such, this life is certainly a gift. As our soul dwells in our body, we get the opportunity to experience all this world has to offer, in good times and in bad. And when it is over, the physical returns to the dust, and the spirit journeys on. There, we will meet again.

In our life together, let us remember how precious and fragile this life is. May we embrace the time we have together. May we seek love. May we be kind. May we rejoice. May we live it fully, together. It will be gone, all to soon. Why waste it? Let's live it! Let's love it. Let's love one another.

Corner Renovation

Our City Council is in the process of approving a renovation to all four corners at Lincolnway and Genesee. Here are the current hopes of the City Council: All four stop lights will be removed and new street lights and concrete ADA approved corners will be put in. Genesee between Lincolnway and Knox St. will become one-way to the north. Genesee between Lincolnway and Main St. will be either permanently blocked off or will become one-way to the south. Drainage will also be updated. Further, the church will receive a new sidewalk and curb alongside Lincolnway. The money is already available for this project and the City hopes to complete it by this fall, as there is already a construction crew hired to do other street work in town. We will then beautify our area along Lincolnway.

Yay!!!! Thanks to our sidewalk for caving in this summer, which has prompted this project to be a top priority. Many thanks to the City of Morrison for the care they've given to our corner this summer already.



MONETARY DONATIONS NEEDED

2023 has been an expensive year for our church. We have had some planned and unplanned building and property expenses. To date, we have not received any donations toward these projects. We still have approximately \$38,632.24 to go, though we know our need will be higher than this amount due to other projects in queue.

CONCRETE WORK:

Approximately \$2,500. Still waiting on the bill.

ELECTRIC WORK: \$6,800

PLUMBING: \$900+

We are contracting Alvarado's to fix a leak that we have been patching ourselves for several years in the youth group room. It is time to have it professionally fixed.

DISHWASHER REPAIR: \$1,014.20 Daycare is paying for half.

NEW AC UNIT FOR FELLOWSHIP ROOM/ OFFICES: \$4,802

OLDS BOILER COMPANY: (Invoices dating back to 2020, including major work in 2023): \$20,116.04

MEN'S BASEMENT BATHROOM RENOVATION: \$2,500 to cover insurance deductible due to water damage via boiler pipe BELL TOWER/ROOF LEAK: We are in need of patching the roof around the bell tower yet a plan has not yet been finalized, so we don't know the amount yet.

FREE PRODUCE TABLE: Same as above. TBD.

LINCOLNWAY BEAUTIFICATION: Once the city fixes our corner and puts in a new sidewalk along Lincolnway, we plan to beautify our Lincolnway property, including repairing/blacktopping parking lot, fencing in the dumpster, landscaping in front of the church, and anything else we see needs improved.

And there are definitely several more projects that need worked on.
