November never knows fully what she does. It's just in her nature. On a morning that finds children rubbing their tummies from too much candy, and parents rubbing their eyes from exhaustion, she shows up nearly naked and ready to lay waste to the land. November strips the trees bare, save for the pin oaks and sycamores. She freezes off the final green in the gardens and forests. Perhaps only kale and brussel sprouts will see her exit. Her harvested fields now show her so recently hidden curves. She taunts creation with cold rain and possibly blankets of ice and snow. However, she gives ligh t blue beautiful skies amidst days of wind and gloom. Perhaps she'll bless us with an Indian summer in which we can shed layers and let the sun kiss our skin once more. But daytime is limited as she brings the earliest sunsets of the year, while rapidly diminishing the length of days. All the wile, she honors the dead, brings in the votes, salutes the veterans, invocates stewardship campaigns at churches, takes cover for shotgun deer season, brings families together over turkey dinners, turns on the ski lifts at the slopes, and welcomes in the season of Ad-

Here in northwest Illinois, as November nudges us to stop thinking about summer and preparing for winter, we find that we need a new mindset. Since late August, we have slowly begun to say goodbye to late sunsets, fireflies, nighttime noises of frogs, cicadas and crickets, bursting gardens and the general freedom felt in the warmer long days. The sun sets early now. Furnaces are turned on. Nighttime noises are just those made by humans. The landscape turns dull and Christmas lights are not yet been lit to bring color to our evenings. We rely on the beauty of sunrises and sunsets to stimulate our senses. Though always sad to say goodbye to our summer ways, and though reluctant we may be, it's always nice to say hello to the onset of winter. Warmer and heavier clothes and blankets securely hug our body. Our pets begin to snuggle closer. People turn back to baking in their kitchens, looking for friends with whom they can share their goods and their time. Our minds turn to reuniting with loved ones and celebrate the opportunity to give thanks.

At churches, sermons follow Jesus to the end of his ministry in, and suddenly turn to the beginning of the Gospels, anticipating the Christ Child to be born and the Word Incarnate to return. November ends in sanctuaries transformed with garland,

wreathes, candles and lights. Pastors and leaders point to the next year's budget and plans, and ask prayerfully for the congregation to help ensure another year of ministry and mission. The church calendar ends celebrating Christ as King, and a new church year begins with Advent.

As we study Jesus at the end of his ministry, we recognize that a man has lived a short life, and has performed a very short ministry,. He knows he is walking toward his impending death, yet he still makes his way to Jerusalem, and once there, he does not back down from his adversaries. No matter what gets tossed at Jesus, he meets it head on, and counters everything with mindful non-violent actions that teach a lesson to all who are willing to watch, listen, and comprehend. He continually preaches love and all that stems from love. He calls for justice, equality, peace, sharing, kindness, and community building. He asks for us to be humbled and exalted, so that we can all find ourselves on the same level, justly treating one another with mutual love. He offers forgiveness to us, no matter how far from God we may feel, and calls us to offer and receive forgiveness with others. He keeps at it because he knows how important it is for humanity. In our busy lives, we forget to pay attention to our bond with God, our own selves, and with one another. Jesus perseveres no matter what, showing us that we too can persevere in the hardships of our lives. Jesus was a human just as we are. Yet Jesus had mastered the control of his mind and his actions. Jesus taught us how he did it...through his relationship with his Father in heaven and through the power of the Holy Spirit, he was able to keep his faith, live with hope, and stay true to his own being. His own people would eventually kill him. His closest followers would soon deny him, while one would betray him. But Jesus kept going at it, all the way to the cross. And even then, death could not keep him down, and with a triumphant resurrection, he returned to finish developing the initial leaders of what would become the Christian Church.

Our lives are no harder than the life Jesus lived. In so many ways, we have a far better life than anyone in Jesus' time. Yet hardships are relative to the individual. There are times that no advice, no direction, and no foresight can seem to help. It is easy to feel sunk deep into the gloomiest days that November has to offer. As we can feel with an onset of seasonal depression, knowing that the winter journey will

be long, we can feel the onset of our times of trial, and imagine that there can be no end. It is easy to want to give up. It is easy to turn inward, focus only on our own self, and fight for our own survival, no matter how it affects others, despite that it's the opposite of what Jesus taught and showed

In these times of trial in our life, and when thinking about Jesus and his teachings, and the hardships of his life don't bring us comfort and direction, we can pause, and contemplate what the end of November brings us...the hope of something new that will save us. If we do not have hope in what can be, then we are lost in an oblivion. There must be at least an initial spark to create a flame. In the darkness, Jesus came to us two thousand years ago. In the darkness of our life now, Jesus is waiting at our side, willing to enter our hearts and minds with love. We just have to open up to the possibility that God is really with us and that there is something to hope for. But to stike that spark, we are going to need to rely on our faith. We need to push out the weight of the moment and recollect that God has been in our life before and that we have overcome other hardships. We need to believe that this too can be overcome. Faith sparks hope. Hope ignites a deeper faith. Our faith then leads us into the next stage of our relationship with the Triune God, and keeps us in that relationship, in which we can find the path we need to travel. And then we can continue along that path and enter into our new

In our life together, we need to lean on one another. As we say goodbye to the remnants of summer and move into winter, we are behooved to not hide in our dens until spring, but rather, we must be emerged to shine our light on others and help them in their dark times. And we find ourselves in the darkness, we can call out to others for help. We have a beloved community around us. We must not forget that. And our community must care for one another, and seek to expand its reach so that God's love may be shared and received by all. In this love, we will find the justice, equality, peace, sharing, kindness, and continued community building that we need. Further, as we turn our minds soon enough to the Thanksgiving holiday, we can begin to explore in our own lives, individually and corporately, how blessed we are and how grateful we can be to God for all we have. As we seek to hope and have faith for a better life
