April passed in reverse. We wore shorts and applied sunscreen the first two weeks, turning then to freezing nights and cool days, while the 30th closed the month out with a cold wind and rain. April watched as daffodils shot up, and faded far too early. The rushing bulbs slowed their immergence when the cold came mid-April, until finally an onslaught of tulips arose, who are delicately embracing the chilly temps. The blossoms of the sour cherry trees endure a record duration of clinging to the branches, which buzz on sunny days in the sound of bees. As the lilacs open, all the fruit trees are aflame with passionate flare. Redbuds dazzle in their glory. Red and yellow finches, red breasted grosbeaks and blazing orange oriels frequent feeders. Blinding carpets of dandelions welcome May's entrance. She appears brilliantly in high gusts of wind. Soon, all the flowers will turn to tones of purple before the month is over, while we transition into meteorological summer (June 1). And here we are, in the midst of God's greatest beauty, in the depths of spring's grand production.

It has been a beautiful spring, despite the crazy change in temperatures. This spring has been a constant reminder of the beauty of God's creation. It gives us insight as to how God creates and how God is at work. God's creation is marvelous, and we get to be part of it, and we have the opportunity to recognize it and embrace it. Yet it is easy to fall into the routines of life, become busy and distracted, and even become filled with negative critique. In our culture, it is easy to gain a mindset of looking for the problems with everything. We can get stuck in only noticing what is wrong with the world. We can program ourselves to only notice the ugly. Often, when we succumb to this way of being, we don't even notice we are doing it. Especially for us in the Midwest, it is easy to have accumulated winter's doldrums as our baggage, and to the world around us, we become a wet blanket, full of woes, complaints and despair. Then spring arrives. Spring beckons us to step out of winter and the gloom we have accumulated in our life. Spring encourages us to recalibrate our mindset and defragment our soul. Spring reminds us there is no need to stay stuck in our woeful ways, but rather, to celebrate the amazing life we have each been blessed with amidst a world full of hope and promise.

When life gets us down, when our focus turns sour, and when we just expect the worse, we set up a barrier around us that pushes away love. If a perfect spring day cannot fill us with joy, ease our minds and raise our spirits, then there is much work for us. Yet if we can let go of our strong grasp on the ills of life, and replace it with smiles and carefree attitudes, then we have the ability to be filled with love. God is prodding us with nature to be the person God has created us to be.

God's love is so great that we cannot fully conceive it. However, we can experience it in various portions in unending ways. When contemplating God and love, it is good to first turn to 1 John 4. Verse 8 tells us, "Whoever does not love does not know God, for God is love." Verse 16 continues, "So we have known and believe the love that God has for us. God is love, and those who abide in love abide in God, and God abides in them." We can imagine God in many ways, but the greatest way to imagine God is God as love. If we embrace this theology, then we can conceive that all of God's creating and maintaining of the universe, our planet, and all that dwells upon and within the plant are created and governed by love. The beauty of spring is an expression of God's love. The love that we pass on between one another and the love we feel for our pets and

for nature's beauty connects us to Gods love and gives us the potential to share God's love.

Throughout human existence, humans forget about, neglect, and refuse God's love. Humans make their life and their world about themselves, and push God into a spiritual real where we only need God when we want God. We forget that God is everywhere and that all came into being and continues to exist because of God. And when we, in our arrogance, experience love, we so easily have no thought of God being present in that love. It is as though love is manmade, human controlled, and limited in the way we want it to be utilized. We divide ourselves from one another. We fight. We hurt. We create war. We despise. We elevate some below us. We place others above us. We create injustice and inequality. We disrupt the natural balance and try to be a god of the world on our own. This is human folly. This is a waste of the potential of our life's experience. This is a sad way to live.

God love is so great in that God is love. God has chosen love to be the nature of God. God chose for all of creation to be made in love. And God does everything in God's power for everything to be part of that love. Yet humans have always struggled with love and relationships. So God has always found ways to reach out to humanity and direct them in the ways of love. It came to the point where God came to earth in human form to be our leader, our teacher, our shepherd, our king, and our savior. God wanted us to know that we can be with God always if we receive God's love, if we embrace God's love, if we utilize God's love to mentally and spiritually heal us, and if we pass on and receive God's love from others. God does not separate Godself from us. We separate ourselves from God. So God reaches out to us, continually, in all the possible ways in which we can recognize


Session Meeting

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and open up to love. God lets us know that our preconceived notions of God which separate us from God, are not binding. We have recorded God in history in many ways. We begin to worship this history as law, and in this law, we bind ourselves to limited notions of God based off previous human experience. And before Jesus, this historical experience lacked the presence of the Holy Spirit in individual and communal life. Humans perceived God as aloof, detached, hard to reach, and often missing. It was a theology that pushed God to come as Jesus and teach us to go beyond those laws and to focus on the law of love. In love we find ourselves eternally connected to God, starting right here in this very moment. We don't need to be trapped in scripture. We can be released in and with love. Certainly, the Gospels are the only authoritative stories we have about the life and teachings of Jesus. They let us know of the life he lived, his ministry, his teachings, his healings and his sacrifice. They show us how much God really loves us and how much God wanted us to move beyond where we were in our relationship to God and one another. Yet the scriptures are intended to free us in life, not encapsulate us. The scriptures lead us to embrace the beauty of God's creation, to seek out love, to embrace love, to utilize love, and to pass on and share love.

In our life together, we have the ability to love one another as Jesus has commanded. Life will toss out variables to trip us up, lead us astray, and set us in a negative and pessimistic mindset. Hate, anger, fear, despair and all those other life-taking emotions want to cling onto us. But we have the ability to turn from that. We must awaken to the beauty in the world

around us. We must focus on what is good, and the potential we posses. We must see that love is all around us, and that means God is all around us. We must share love with one another, and not limit our love to our own select groups.

Springtime is for everyone. God's love is for everyone. We can individually enjoy spring. We can individually enjoy love. Yet when we embrace, share and enjoy it mutually, then the power of the beauty and the power of love increases as we increase the space in which we give and receive love. So let us melt the winter within and live into this new spring so that we may harvest an abundant crop of love in the summer of our life.
