A new spring dawns on our world in 2021 in a whole new way. Two years ago, it was just another spring. The weather was this way or that. The flowers would eventually spring up, the trees and grass would eventually turn green. Life was what life always was. There were ups and downs. There were unexpected moments, for better or for worse. Regardless, it was just another spring, just like all the other springs.

Last year, however, was a spring we will never forget. We were sent hiding into our homes, afraid of a virus we knew nothing about. "How long?" was a question we continually asked. "What do we do now?" was a question we had to begin to ask. In many ways, the past year has seemed to be like we have been in a shipwreck, floating amidst debris.

At first, it was as though there were huge waves floundering us. How do we get groceries? How do we order online? Do we need to wipe down every thing we buy when we get it home? Do we need to wipe down every surface in our vehicles and homes all the time? For many, the question of how do I work from home, especially if my kids now don't have school or day care...? Just how is this virus being transmitted? What will happen if I get it? What's the percentage of people who will die from it? How sick will I get? Will I die from it? Will loved die from it? Will we spread it to others? Panic, fear, anxiety...the unknown.

Time passed. The waves began to calm. We found something to hold onto as we kept floating at sea. The virus kept spreading at greater rates, but we knew more about it. We began to know people getting sick. We began to know at least people who knew people who died from it. Then we began to know people who died from it. Wearing a mask went from being something that was discouraged, to being enforced, to being a regular routine. Cases kept rising. It was time to send our children

and youth, young adults, teachers and students back to school. Fear and anxiety rose again, as though the waves reemerged. Business and churches all chose new approaches. Some places opened, some had never actually closed, some stayed closed, some others went back and forth, went out of business. The economy went up and down.

All the while, racism and acts of violence continued to rip our nation apart. A race for the presidency hung in the air. Cases continued to rise. Thanksgiving and Christmas came, at the peak of transmission. There was a promise of vaccines to be here soon. There was a new president elected and an old president refusing to leave.

How long? How long?
How long?
How long? How long?

There was fear of violence and an uprising, and the potential of the old president staying through the use of force. Vaccines arrived, a new president was in place, cases slowly started to subside, winter faded away. Spring breaks started, cases started to rise again, vaccines became more and more abundant. Another spring has come, and other Easter on its way.

We are still floating at sea. We believe we can see the shore...it's not just a mirage on the horizon. Most of the older adults we know have been vaccinated. And very soon, everyone 16 and older will have the chance to be vaccinated. The world is so tired of this all that it is very easy to let it all go...to say enough is enough and I'm going back to the way I was, and I don't care anymore. But there is still the chance of the current changing. There is nothing to say that we won't get pulled back to sea. We are so close, but the virus is

mutating. We are letting down our guards before we can touch the ground.

Yesterday I took my sons to Peoria to see my parents. It was my mom's birthday and we hadn't seen them since Christmas-time. When we got about 20 minutes away, my 3 year old began to ask, "Are we there yet?" I smiled, as a father should smile when realizing his son has figured out how to ask what every other child has learned to ask... how much longer...are we there yet??? Yes, we are almost there, I told him 347 times. Of course, he then added, "I have to go potty," as we were two minutes away. The urgency to get to where we were going increased exponentially as we got closer and closer. Until, finally, we were there.

How long? How long? The question of "How long?" is asked 50 times in the New Revised Standard Version of the Bible. It was first asked in Exodus 10:3, "So Moses and Aaron went to Pharaoh, and said to him, "Thus says the Lord, the God of the Hebrews, "How long will you refuse to humble yourself before me? Let my people go, so that they may worship me.'" It is then directed back to the Pharaoh by his officials in Exodus 10:7, "Pharaoh's officials said to him, "How long shall this fellow be a snare to us? Let the people go, so that they may worship the Lord their God; do you not yet understand that Egypt is ruined?'''

In Numbers, God asks about how long the people will rebel against God and shows up occasionally until it becomes a favorite question of the Psalmist and then of the Prophets. It's a great question. Where is God? How long must we wait for God to return us to where we believe we should be? And then it is a good return question from God. Why won't the humans lovingly behave the way they were instructed? How long until they return to God?

MINISTER'S MESSAGE

How long, how long, how long? Humans have always wanted this question answered in one way or another. However, the answer is always the same...we don't know.

What we do know is that we have this very moment in time...we have right now. We know that, though there is much going on in the world that is out of our control, we still have the ability to have control of our own lives. Most importantly, we have the ability to love.

This past year has been an opportunity for every human on earth to use these changing times as a catalyst to help make the necessary changes in their life to help make their life and the lives off those whom they are able to help to be the best it can be. Unfortunately, not everyone lived through this year. Some lost their lives to COVID, some lost it to violence, some lost it to natural causes, some lost it to accidents. But for those of us who have been blessed to see this new spring, we have had the chance to take advantage of the new world.

Though it has been said that we have explored all the lands on earth, we have not finished exploring the new opportunities as the world changes around us...that is limitless. As we can see that the land we are seeking is likely in sight, and remain prayerful that nothing in the current changes that will keep us from reaching shore, we have to embrace that the land we embark on is not going to be the same. The old normal is gone. It's history. We do not know what the new future of our world holds. We just know we can't hold onto what was. And as we continue upon this adventure of life, we need to remain connected to God and the love that permeates from God.

We are taught in the Gospel of John that Jesus offered his disciples a new commandment. The Latin term *mandatum* means mandate or commandment, and began what we call Maundy Thursday. This new *mandatum* was given to the disciples during a humbling act of feet washing, in which Jesus acted as the servant to others. He then told them that this mandate was to love one another. That's it. That's the whole story from the beginning of creation to today. That's the sole act that humanity needs to focus on. That's what God has always been steering us toward. Love one another.

How long until we see God present in our life? It will take as long as it takes us to receive love; as long as it takes to love our self; as long as it takes to love God back; as long as it takes to love our neighbor. That's how long.

The world is always changing. There will always be something going to push up against our 'normal' and make our lives uncomfortable. That's just part of being a part of nature. But to be able to receive and extend love is always a constant. How we are able to receive and give is always changing as well. Someone who is easy to love today may be hard to love by this evening. Or vice versa. But the real struggle is not how long we must wait, but rather, how hard we must work to love one another, just as Jesus loved us.

In our life together, as we enter into the holiest days of the Christian year, and as we enter into a spring in which we see that we are that much closer to ending the current chapter on the COVID-era and soon to open the next chapter of this book (which is of course unknown because it is not yet read in our history), we have the ability to hang onto love. We can love God with our entire being. We can love our neighbor as ourself. And we can do this as a beloved community.

The end is not here yet as long as we haven't taken our last breath. The love of God remains with us always, promised to us by Jesus as he sacrificed his life for us on the cross so that we could be in full relationship with God. This began the 'glorification of Christ', which peaked on Easter Sunday as he rose from the dead and was completed upon his ascension. God remains with us in Word, in Spirit and as Creator. Love is the path to find our new creation. The Spirit will connect us to the Triune God all along the way, through all the ups and downs. The Word will continue to speak to us and guide us, just as Jesus did while with us in human form on earth. May we, together, seek for a new world filled only with love, rising to a new life with our risen Lord. For indeed, the Lord has risen. Let us, together, with Christ as our center, rise to new life as well. ■

In March, Workman's Heating and Cooling installed air purifying ionizers to the air handlers in the sanctuary, the fellowship room and the four wall-HVAC units in the dining room. Resurrection of the Lord/Easter

The festival of the Resurrection of the Lord (or Easter Sunday) is the center of the Christian year. On this occasion the church joyfully proclaims the good news that is at the very heart of the gospel: that Jesus Christ is risen from the dead.

It is sometimes said that every Sunday is a "little Easter"; liturgical theologian Laurence Stookey suggests that it might be more appropriate to say that every Easter is a "great Sunday" (*Calendar: Christ's Time for the Church*, Abingdon Press, 1996, 158-161). Easter Sunday is the Lord's Day writ large: a great annual celebration of Christ's

resurrection on the first day of the week...

Easter Sunday is something like the keystone of an arch—the top and center stone upon which all the other stones lean and depend—both in terms of its theological significance and its relation to other events in the Christian year. Theologically speaking, the faith we claim and the life we live depend on the affirmation, celebration and proclamation of Christ's resurrection. In a chronological sense—since Easter is a "moveable feast," taking place on a different date each year—all the other events



of the Christian year (from the Transfiguration of the Lord and Ash Wednesday through Pentecost and Trinity Sunday) pivot around the date of Easter Sunday, shifting accordingly.
