What's that you say? Summer's over? The nights are now longer than days? The frost is coming tonight?

Jupiter shines bright amidst shooting stars as September blows a chilly goodbye kiss in her shivering curtsy, ushering in October, readying for the final harvest. The wind rushes through the dry corn, first whistling, and then as though a parade of racing cars are passing by. The soybeans end a most amazing exhibit of glowing golden blankets, rivaling the best and most beautiful of any other year's transition from green leaves to tall dry pod stalks. The hardening corn ears of northwest IL begin to drop, while the bean pods now peak over the fields, both nodding to the farmer that the time for harvest is here. Grain truck drivers fill their semis with last year's bounty from the local bins, carrying them off be turned to food, fuel, fabrics, and polymers. Farmers pull their harvesters from their barns, tossing out mouse nests, and uploading new software. The outer edges of cornfields are wisped away, with maize shooting from the harvesters augers into grain wagons pulled by old tractors. The first bean fields are flattened, sending the Asian lady beetles looking for a new home. Electricians visit farms and hook up dryers, which soon fill their air with their hardworking hum. Fuel trucks begin to roam the blacktops. Another harvest is at hand.

In the orchards, apples dangle, waiting for hands to grab them and stuff them in a sack, praying to become grandma's prized pie. Children wander among the pumpkin patches, rolling fat gourds back to their minivan. Mums, cosmos and zinnias become the last flowers to bloom in planted gardens. Meanwhile, varieties of small white flowers and purple asters blossom in the ditches, woodlands and prairies as September's yellow flowers fade away. Evening weekend air is filled with the fragrant smoke of backyard bonfires and barbeques, as the horns, drums and cymbals of bands and cheers of fans roar out from beyond stadiums, where folks dress in winter garb to keep them warm as they cheer for the home team.

What's that you say? Summer's over? The frost never took hold last night, but what about tonight?

Here we are, another summer over. Autumn has set in. The first trees begin their transition to yellow, orange and red. The grass remains green this year and mowers are still busy keeping it trimmed. Children sit in classes all day, learning, growing, and wiggling. Sports teams practice and compete. Retirees check their calendars for how long until they head south. In the mean time, furnaces turn on, first filling the houses with a bitter unpleasant smell of six months of dust quickly burning away.

Churches open their doors, apprehensively hoping for newcomers and inactive members to arrive, promoting their new plans that promise the building and deepening of relationships, and the garnering of knowledge. Older adults wonder what happened to the olden days where pews were packed and every available room in the church was filled with Sunday school classes. Young families stay home on Sundays with their children, seeking sabbath from their busy week and no longer feeling guilt for it. Empty spaces in the pews and deficits in budgets are stared upon. Another funeral finds friends bidding farewell, and one less person they will see again next Sunday. The inevitable changes of the church world that have been happening for over two decades still leave our nation in wonder. What ever happened? What will the future be? What are we to do? How much longer can we maintain?

Our small towns and big cities are filled with churches that were built by immigrants, who all split up from the melting pot to worship with their 'kind'. Dutch, Swedes, Germans, English, French, Italians, Irish, Polish, Scandinavians....all the white people of western Europe with their own unique brand of protestant Christianity, as well as all the varying Catholic nationalities, broke apart from one another as they settled down on the lands of native people. They built massive churches for low costs, without thought of the upkeep it would take 150+ years later. The century turned and world wars, droughts, and a Great Depression passed and a golden era arose. Soldiers returned from Europe and the Pacific, and babies boomed. Churches built education wings to house their overabundance of church school students. Factory stacks smoked day and night though the small towns and cities. Then the world changed. The 1960s faded into a transformed world of the 1970s, the baby production craze faded, and a two to three child home became the norm. Factories ceased their smoke as production moved south and overseas. The greed of the 80s created bubbles of economic collapse, and all the while, people migrated to where they could find jobs. Suburbs now boomed while the rural world began to reflect ruins. Churches weren't paying attention. They still relished in their potlucks and subcommittees. They didn't see it coming. They still took care of their own. They weren't looking out their doors. And then, all of a sudden, it was the 2000s, and the crowded choir lofts dwindled and space in the pews was no longer a rare occurrence. We were left gazing at our navels. Were was Jesus anyway? We were listening about him in the sermon. We were singing to him in our hymns. We were talking to him in our prayers. But were we serving him? Churches had forgotten that Jesus never mentioned that churches should become what they had turned into. Jesus never called for us to separate into various groups, each build our own monumental gathering place, and then to call people into our fold to care for them, write checks to help those we will never meet, to focus on a budget, a Sunday School program, a membership roll, and worship attendance statistics. This is something we made up in our society since the 1800s. We replaced serving Christ with serving the Church. The Church itself became an idol. Our desire for a big budget and packed pews was not to equip the congregation to do everincreasing works for this world as Jesus' disciples. It was to grow and grow and grow our own flock, and to take care of them. This is not to say that churches did not make impacts in their communities and the world. nor that the members didn't need to care for one another, but the overall



focus of churches in the U.S.A. was inward. But the world Jesus served was outward.

We need to remember there is more than just 'us'. And that is what churches today are starting to realize. Churches, like our own, feel called to help this world in the ways in which we are able. As we look after one another, we look beyond our walls to see where there are needs, and explore how we can meet those needs.

God has always called us to love one another. Jesus continually calls us together to move beyond our divisions so that we can find unity in bringing healing to this world through the power of the Holy Spirit. The idea for the future of the world, as Jesus taught, was to irradicate the divisions that create inequality and injustice. The barriers of society were to be irradicated. We were all to become one, in God's love. If we each open ourselves up to God's love, if we each love our own self, and if we each seek to love our neighbor as ourself, then we can make this happen. But that's what

God has been calling for us to do long before Jesus' time on earth. The earliest proof of our Jewish ancestors is when then established a monarchy around 1,000 years before Jesus walked the earth.
